Course pre-requisite/s and co-requisite/s are strictly enforced, as are entrance and maintenance criteria (if applicable) for the successful completion of the degree.

Prospective majors should consult the undergraduate advisor as soon as possible to plan their program of study. No more than three courses taught in English, including the required "Eurocourse," on relevant aspects of Italian culture may count toward the major.

-Students who enter with prior study of Italian must consult with the Italian Undergraduate Program Advisor or a Departmental Representative for placement at their level of proficiency.
