

Family & Consumer Sciences Education Programs Leading to Certification New York State Policies & Grade Expectations

According to New York State policies, teacher candidates should be aware of grade and expectations for their coursework completed and submitted to qualify for certification:

- Pedagogical core (professional education) coursework requirements.
 Pedagogical core coursework can be completed on either the undergraduate or graduate level. However, such coursework must be completed at an institution of higher education that has state-approved educator preparation programs that leads to certification in the state where the institution is physically located or a community college with an articulation agreement with such an institution (contact your college). Undergraduate pedagogical core coursework must be completed with a minimum grade of C, and graduate coursework must be completed with a minimum grade of B-.
- Content core (subject) coursework requirements. Content core coursework refers to coursework in the specific subject matter of the certificate title sought (e.g., Mathematics, Biology, Spanish). It is the equivalent of a major in that subject area. Coursework in the content core must be completed at an institution that is accredited by an institutional accrediting agency recognized for this purpose by the U.S. Department of Education. Undergraduate content core coursework must be completed with a minimum grade of C, and graduate coursework must be completed with a minimum grade of B.

To summarize, NYS determines minimum grade requirements for acceptable coursework:

Acceptable Course Grades

- Content Core Undergraduate coursework must be completed with a grade of "C" or above, and graduate coursework must be completed with a "B-" or above.
- Pedagogical Core Undergraduate coursework must be completed with a grade of "C" or above, and graduate coursework must be completed with a "B-" or above.

Achieving the required grades to satisfy state requirements is the teacher candidate's responsibility.
