Department News

The department welcomed a new member this year, Assistant Professor Andrew Amstutz. Hired as a historian of Islam, Andrew is also an expert on South Asia, particularly Pakistan and Bangladesh. Andrew grew up in South Carolina, where he acquired a love of hiking and Dolly Parton's music. College took him to Middlebury, where he studied Italian and history. After completing his PhD at Cornell, Andrew taught at the University of Arkansas-Little Rock. His research also brought stints living in India where he explored Urdu libraries in Delhi, Lucknow, and Hyderabad. Now at Queens, Andrew is thrilled to get to know our diverse borough (the Hindu Temple canteen is already a favorite lunch spot). He's happy to be near family and friends in the region, among them his toddler nephew in Brooklyn. And he's already made a splash as advisor to the History Club, helping to revive the group after its pandemic-era dormancy.

History also welcomed visiting scholar Nourit Zimerman here on a fellowship from the Israel Institute. Nourit is an expert on modern Israeli law based at Sapir Academic College. In addition to teaching, she recently shared her reflections on Israel between the war in Gaza and the constitutional crisis at an event sponsored by the Jewish Studies program.

This semester, **Grace Davie** paired her African History course with one at the University of Abuja, allowing joint work between students in New York and Nigeria. This is part of the Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) program, an exciting example of the potential of online teaching. Grace reports that the collaboration is a smashing success she hopes to repeat in future semesters.



On a sad note, we lost several faculty since the publication of our last newsletter. Isaac Alteras, historian of modern Israel and US foreign policy, passed away in April 2022. John O'Brien, who brought the world of Alexander the Great to legions of students and readers, died in July 2022. And esteemed historian of urban planning in New York (and former chair of History) Jon Peterson passed away in July 2023. We mourn their loss.

Andrew Amstutz published an article on the WWII-era travel writings of Mahmooda Rivzia and another on Urdu visions of Persian pasts... Former graduate teaching fellow and adjunct Lindsay Krasnoff published Basketball Empire: France and the Making of a Global NBA and WNBA (Bloomsbury, 2023).
